Sej Saraiya is a documentary and cultural-conservation photographer who graduated with a Master's degree in Film & Writing from USC in 2009. She has since traveled to the deep interiors of Asia and the Americas, capturing stories of cultures on the brink of extinction. Her photographs have been exhibited both in America and India and hang in the homes of private collectors in Belgium, Switzerland, Australia, India, South Africa, Canada and the United States.

Matthew Gush is the university photographer at California State University, Fullerton. His photographs have been collected by National Geographic, featured by the New York Times, and are represented by Getty Images. His work focuses on Pre-Columbian Native America and chronicles interjections of Colonial Empires.
